Berry-Vize Family Papers, ca. 1880s-2019 [bulk 1920s-1990s]. 21 boxes (221 folders), ca. 10,000 items.

INTRODUCTION

This collection centers on the lives of William Nathan (WN Sr., 1885-1965), Elizabeth (Bess, 1890-1980) Vize Berry, and their thirteen children: John Vize (1911-1990), Mary Elizabeth (1913-2004), William Nathan Jr. (1914-2009), Francis Xavier, (1916-2006), James Fant (1917-1997), Margaret (1918-2019), Katherine Anita Fuller (1920-1983), Joseph Louis (1921-1996), Ann Louise (1922-1958), Marie François Thérèse Kelleher (1924-1999), Benedict Regis (1926-2017), Thomas Gabriel (1929-), and Stephen Badin (1933-2011). Also noticed in this collection are achievements of some third-generation Berry family members, including J. Madeleine (Berry) Nash, Mary Elizabeth (Mary Beth) Berry, James Michael Berry, and Gabriel Berry.

Arrangement: This collection is arranged into eighteen groups: one for the parents and each of the 13 children, as well as Other Family Members, Genealogy, Miscellaneous, and News & Reunions.

Provenance: The bulk of this collection was donated by Dr. Margaret Berry (one of the thirteen Berry children) and assigned the accession number 2008.19.1.

Processing: This collection was organized by volunteer Kimberly Lanham, and the finding aid was completed in November 2011.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

As a Southern Railroad employee from Middlesboro, Kentucky, William Nathan Berry (WN) and wife Elizabeth Ernestine Vize Berry (Bess) arrived in Greensboro, NC, in early 1913. Until 1920 they lived on Edgeworth Street and then moved to 800 Douglas Street. Six years later they built and in 1927 moved into a large brick residence at 1206 Colonial Avenue in Kirkwood.

While supervising the unloading of carloads of coal ordered by Greensboro businessmen, WN recognized a growing market for fuel. Accordingly in 1924 he and Bess formally opened the Berry Coal (and Wood) Company on West Bragg Street. In a financial emergency occasioned by WN's illness, Martin Douglas provided a loan witnessed, not by paper signatures, but by a gentlemen's handshake. In time trucks replaced wagons, oil supplemented earlier fuels, air conditioning became a staple, and the company moved successively to larger venues on West Lee Street and Bessemer Avenue. The company name evolved into the present Berico Fuels, Incorporated.

Devoted to his new city, WN early on participated in Greensboro civic activities, notably the Lions Club and the Greensboro Merchants Association, where he once served as president. He and Bess faithfully attended St. Benedict's Catholic Church and, when it opened in 1926, supported St. Benedict's elementary school. In 1942 the Golden Rule Foundation of America conferred on Bess Vize Berry its highest award: American Mother of the Year.

Older children attended Catholic high schools and colleges in Emmitsburg, Maryland: boys at historic Mount St. Mary's Preparatory School, College, and Seminary and girls at St. Joseph's High School and College at the Provincial House of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul. All 13 children received a college education, and higher degrees included two Ph.D.s (history and English), one MD (obstetrician and gynecologist), one Licentiate (philosophy), and Master's degrees in, respectively, hospital administration, South Asian studies, and mathematics. In addition to their academic achievements, all eight sons served in the US military, four during World War II and four during the Korean War.

For more detailed family history and biographical information, see Appendix A.

SCOPE & CONTENT NOTE

Most of this collection spans the first half of the twentieth century, though some photographs date to the nineteenth. Correspondence and photographs relate mostly to the 1942 American-Mother-of-the-Year award received by Elizabeth Berry. Letters of recommendation in the scrapbooks include Greensboro businessmen and city leaders (**Group I 1:3 and 1:5**). Another portion of the collection pertains to the life and works of Margaret Berry (**Group IX**) and includes manuscripts and published books and articles, as well as correspondence and a journal. Photographs in this group include Greensboro family members as well as relatives from prior generations (**IX 5:1**). Also of note are reports on Berry-Vize family reunions, directories, and genealogical research.

The group relating to Father Thomas (WN Jr., Brother) spans his time at St. Michael's Monastery, Union City, NJ; Immaculate Conception Monastery, Jamaica, NY; and Washington D.C. residences (**Group XIV**). While the collection includes personal letters among other materials, Thomas's records are primarily housed in Harvard University's Environmental Science and Public Policy Archives.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

I. William Nathan and Elizabeth V. Berry

1. Correspondence. 7 folders. 1940s.

This series includes letters and information regarding the 1942 choice of the American Mother of the Year and the personal correspondence of Elizabeth V. Berry (1:6). Some letters are original, others copies, most compiled into scrapbooks. Local and nationally known individuals endorsing Bess as candidate for the 1942 American Mother of the Year award include the Governor of North Carolina, J. Melville Broughton; Greensboro's mayor, Huger S. King; actor Bing Crosby; and secretaries to both Franklin D. Roosevelt and Eleanor Roosevelt (1:3-5). Also included are letters of congratulations following the award (1:2).

2. Financial & Legal Documents. 9 folders. 1910-1980.

The financial and legal documents include some banking documents and notes of charitable donations (2:1) and deeds of trust (2:2). Also included are an account of the Berry home dissolution following Elizabeth's 1980 death (2:3), her Social Security card (2:4), the Berry homestead inventory (2:5), the 1910 Berry-Vize marriage certificate, and the listing of cemetery plots for WN (2:9). Many documents regarding life and property insurance, including several from Jefferson-Pilot, can be found in this group (2:6).

3. Literary Productions. 1 folder. 1927-1982.

Speeches and reminiscences make up writings in this folder. Included are "Christian Motherhood" and "The Christian Family in America" by Elizabeth V. Berry (3:1).

4. Miscellaneous. 1 folder (1 item). 1980.

This folder contains Elizabeth V. Berry's funeral autograph book.

5. Photographic Material. 7 folders. 1800s-1980.

These folders contain family photos, mostly of parents Elizabeth and WN Sr., with their 13 children. Included are a 1933 Berry family photograph (5:4), a banquet image of the American Mother of the Year (5:3), Elizabeth Vize Berry's parents (5:5), and a 1903 portrait of WN Berry Sr. (5:6).

6. Printed Material. 3 folders. 1942-2005.

This series includes American Mother of the Year clippings (6:1), WN Sr.'s 1965 obituary (6:2), the pamphlet *A Brief History of St. Benedict Parish 1877-1977*, and a program for the 1937 Altrusa Convention at the Sedgfield Inn in Greensboro (6:3).

7. Scrapbooks. 8 folders. 1882-1980.

Of five scrapbooks in this series, two relate to the 1942 American Mother of the Year award: the first, newspapers clippings from the campaign (7:1-2); the second, letters as well as further clippings (7:3-4). Two others focus on WN Sr. "All About Pop" contains photographs from the North Carolina Catholic Laymen Retreats 1942-1953, Belmont Abbey, Belmont, North Carolina (7:5). "More About Pop," offers nineteenth-century photographs of WN Sr.'s ancestors (7:6). Yet another scrapbook commemorates the 1960 Golden Wedding Anniversary of WN and Elizabeth (7:8).

II. Ann Louise (Sister Zoé Marie) Berry**1. Correspondence. 2 folders. 1944-1958.**

Organized mostly in plastic sleeves, these photographs and personal letters come from Ann's time at Maryknoll Seminary, NY, and in the Philippines. Seminary letters request family news and describe novitiate life. The letters from the Philippines describe her surroundings and daily events (1:1). Earlier letters in the second folder reminisce about times at home in North Carolina. The 1957-1958 letters are mostly from Father Leo Davis, describing Ann's diminishing activities in the infirmary as her life ebbed away.

2. Diary. 2 folders (3 items). 1941-1957.

Ann's personal diary 1941-1942, in a brown hardbound book, describes personal and spiritual thoughts and struggles. Entries quote from and recall thoughts from recent lectures as well as news from her North Carolina family (2:1). Beginning September 8, 1943, a small, spiral notebook lists spiritual readings; another, April 18, 1957, reflects on religious matters and on everyday events.

3. Photographic Material. 1 folder (18 items). ca. 1950-1958.

Photographs in this folder span a few years of Ann's life as a nun and include images from her 1958 funeral.

4. Scrapbook. 1 folder (1 item). 1922-1958.

The scrapbook "Ann's Life Depicted in Pictures" covers her early years through adulthood and her time at Villahermosa, Mexico. Following letters of condolence after her 1958 death, are her birth certificate and photos from her childhood, one as a toddler with her mother and another with a sibling, through teenage years shown in portraits with friends and two school groupings. Next are images of Ann as novice, and her personal account of "A Day in the Life of Sister Zoé Marie, April 11, 1955." The narrative includes her Laguna de Bay trip, with descriptions of opening coconuts for milk and visiting a sulfur spring. Entries conclude with pictures of Ann's 1958 funeral.

III. Benedict Regis (Ben) Berry

1. Correspondence. 1 folder (1 item). ca. 1946-1947.

Written from St. Benedict's Abbey in Atchison, Kansas, Ben's letter to his parents in Greensboro reports how he is doing and how much he misses home.

2. List. 1 folder (1 item). 1939-1992.

Listing of dates and places of education and employment for Ben range from his 1939 school days at Belmont Abbey Prep, Belmont, North Carolina, to his 1992 retirement from teaching philosophy at Gaston College, Gastonia, North Carolina.

3. Photographic Material. 1 folder (9 items). ca. 1997-2002.

Photographs of Ben as an older man, mostly at family gatherings, show those in attendance, notably at 1997 and 2002 events.

IV. Francis Xavier (Frank)

1. Correspondence. 2 folders (3 items). ca 1930s and 2005.

The first folder (1:1) holds a note on a Prudential Realty card addressed to Uncle Brother (Father Thomas, WN Jr.) from Frank's daughter, Patricia. The second holds two 1930s letters from Frank to his parents from the University of Notre Dame (1:2), the first describing a football game against Northwestern, the second reporting on his health and inquiring after the family at home in North Carolina.

2. Photographic Material. 1 folder (38 items). ca. 1960s-2000s.

Photographs in this folder cover mostly family events in Frank's life, notably 1970s pictures of the Berry home on Colonial Avenue in Greensboro's Kirkwood neighborhood.

3. Printed Material. 4 folders. ca. 1935-2006.

This folder of clippings contains a photograph of Frank's daughter Susan being baptized by Uncle Brother (3:1). A second folder (3:2) holds obituaries for both Frank (1996) and wife Polly (1994), along with their funeral programs. Also of interest is Frank's 1935-1936 Notre Dame report card citing a 67 in Physics in the first semester (3:3).

V. James Fant (Jim) Berry

1. Children of James Berry. 1 folder. ca. 2000s.

This folder features writings and drawings of James (Jim) Berry's children and grandchildren. Most appear to focus on school projects (1:1), including a crayon drawing and story on Mad Cow by grandson Christopher Berry, and similar productions of granddaughter Emily. Also included are emails from grandson Seth Berry and Jim Fant Berry's own son, Jim Michael Berry.

2. Correspondence. 3 folders. ca. 1940s-2008.

Letters here cover much of Jim's time in the US Military Academy at West Point (2:1), written mostly to his parents, a few to siblings. Also in the folder are 1989 letters covering a family disagreement over political issues, mainly capitalism. Exchanged between brothers Jim and Joe, 1993 letters highlight conflicting views (2:2). Additional letters relating to these matters can be found in Joe's group (VII 1:2). The last folder in the series contains family correspondence of Jim's wife, Mary Loram Berry (2:3).

3. Literary Material. 2 folders. ca. 1950-2005.

Articles and other personal writings by James Fant Berry include the poem "River," co-authored with Brother (Thomas Berry) circa 1950 (3:1). Other entries include articles by as well as biographical information about Jim's wife, Mary Elizabeth Loram Berry, and a reprint of daughter Mary Beth Berry's 2005 *Journal of Asian Studies* article, "Presidential Address--Samurai Trouble: Thoughts on War and Loyalty" (3:2).

4. Miscellaneous. 1 folder (1 item). 1985.

A N.C. Council of Churches statement on Selective Conscientious Objection offers advice to those ministering to young people confronted with a call to military service.

5. Obituaries/Remembrances. 1 folder. ca. 1997-2000.

Obituaries and remembrances for James Fant Berry include a *Raleigh News and Observer* article entitled "Hero of WWII and environment, J.F. Berry (5:1)."

6. Photographic Material. 2 folders. ca. 1940s-2008.

This series features a framed group-military photograph, including a priest, with James and Mary Berry at the center (6:1). Among family photographs is a 1940s reprint of Jim in his military uniform and a 1950s portrait of Jim and Mary (6:2).

7. Printed Material. 3 folders (6 items). 1980-1998.

Most items in this series are events relating to Jim and Mary Berry, the first a brochure for the 1993 Berry-Vize family reunion (7:1), followed by an invitation to daughter Mary Beth's 1980 marriage to Donald Shively (7:2), and in the last folder the 1998 memorial Mass program for Mary Looram Berry (7:3).

8. Scrapbook. 2 folders (1 item). 1936-1997.

This scrapbook, in two folders, contains mementos from James Fant Berry's life. The first includes letters from West Point and a newspaper clipping about the 1940 US Military Academy graduating class (8:1); the second holds photographs and clippings from Jim's later life, including photos of the extended family and copies of obituaries (8:2).

VI. John (Jack) Berry**1. Correspondence. 2 folders (6 items). 1948-2007.**

The first folder in this series contains correspondence from the children of John (Jack) Berry. Besides emails, there is a 1997 letter to daughter Madeleine Nash from Sigma Xi, the Scientific Research Society, electing her as honorary member (1:1). The second folder holds a 1948 letter from Jack's sister Ann Louise (Sr. Zoé Marie), writing from Manila and inquiring after his family (1:2).

2. Obituaries/Remembrances. 1 folder (6 items). 1990 and 2002.

This series contains both clippings and funeral programs relating to the deaths of Jack Berry (1990) and wife Jessie Madeleine Berry (2002).

3. Photographic Material. 1 folder. ca. 1911-2010.

The time span of material in this folder is great, including a baby portrait of John (Jack) Berry, born in 1911, as well as family photos from the 1970s. Most recent are computer printed photographs of 2010 family events.

4. Printed Material. 2 folders. 1985-2006.

This series encompasses printed material relating to Jack Berry and that of daughter J. Madeleine Berry Nash. The first folder contains several *Time* magazine articles written by Madeleine from 1996-2002, notably "Addict," and the 2006 "Storm Warnings," in the *Smithsonian Magazine*. Also in the folder are a biographical booklet about Madeleine and a listing of her major articles (4:1). A second folder offers a program celebrating Merse's (Sister Elizabeth Berry's) 1988 Golden Jubilee as a Daughter of Charity and another for the 1985 Berry-Vize Reunion (4:2).

VII. Joseph (Joe) Louis Berry

1. Correspondence. 3 folders. 1966-2008.

Correspondence in this series includes a 1990 family-photo Christmas card (1:1) as well as letters and emails from Joseph's children and grandchildren (1:3). The second folder offers 1991-1993 letters between Joe and brother Jim during a time of disagreement (1:2) [Additional letters appear in Jim's group (V 2:2).]

2. Financial Documents. 1 folder (1 item). 1993.

This series contains a personal financial statement for Joseph Berry dating from April 14, 1993.

3. Literary Productions. 1 folder (7 items). ca. 1995-2000s.

Joseph Louis's children and grandchildren wrote the articles and papers contained in this folder, among them Kim Dawkins Berry's newspaper article, "Proposed residency requirement makes sense," and Ann Berry Somers's paper, "Reflections on Scouting."

4. Photographic Material. 1 folder. 1966-2000s.

Photos of Joseph Louis Berry and his family appear in this series, mainly of small groups during family gatherings. An exception pictures a Knights-of-Columbus gathering in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, February 25, 1962.

5. Printed Material. 4 folders. 1960-2007.

This series includes newspaper clippings and other funeral information on Joseph Berry (5:1-2). Highlighted is Joe's 1996 receipt of Notre Dame University's award for humanitarian service, the Dr. Thomas A. Dooley Award (5:3). The last folder contains articles and programs about Joe and Jean's children, including the 1998 obituary and funeral program for son Philip V. Berry (5:4).

6. School Materials. 1 folder (2 items). 1935-1937.

This series includes Joseph Louis Berry's 1935 report card from Newman School in Lakewood, New Jersey, and his 1937 dance book for the Graduation Hop at the U.S. Military Academy.

VIII. Katherine Anita Fuller

1. Correspondence. 2 folders. 1954-2008.

The first folder in this series contains the personal correspondence of Katherine Anita Fuller (1:1). Of note is Katherine's October 18, 1957, letter to sisters Mary Elizabeth and Zoé Marie about husband Snooks's death and his struggle with alcoholism. Also in this

folder is Katherine's February 14, 1955, character reference letter for Bennett College student Rose Inza Kim, a Korean exchange scholar. The second folder contains mostly emails and holiday letters from later generations of Katherine's family (1:2).

2. Literary Productions. 3 folders. ca. 1950s.

Writings pertaining to Katherine Anita Fuller comprise the items in this series. The first folder features copies of *Fuller News Notes* 1956-1957, a newsletter with materials on both the Berry and Fuller families (2:1). The second folder collects Katherine's personal writings. In "Moments of Profit," she explains how extra moments at a red light or in a waiting room can be used to think of and pray to God (2:2). The third folder contains an undated copy of Katherine's resume as a document examiner (2:3).

3. Miscellaneous. 1 folder (1 item). 1983.

In 1983 Katherine Anita received from St. Gabriel's Retreat House a certificate assuring her of a newly won blessing "to share perpetually in the benefit of daily Mass" in every Passionist Monastery(3:1).

4. Photographic Material. 1 folder. ca. 1940-2000s.

Katherine Anita's collection includes children, pets, and family events and gatherings.

5. Printed Material. 2 folders. 1953-2008.

Two categories, clippings and programs, include a 1970s newspaper article about Katherine's handwriting analysis skills (5:1) and a 1996 funeral program for brother Joseph Louis (5:2).

IX. Margaret Berry

1. Correspondence. 3 folders. 1953-2009.

Three folders make up the records for Margaret Berry. The first contains personal and professional correspondence 1953-2009, beginning with a 1953 letter written by Margaret while a nun. A 2001 John Carroll University letter grants Margaret JCU Emeritus status (1:1). Dating from 1976-1999, a second folder includes Margaret's 1989 letter to *Newsweek's* editor charging that Kenneth L. Woodward's article about Thomas Berry's works and beliefs shows a shallow grasp of her brother's legacy (1:2). The last folder contains correspondence between Margaret and Chinese novelist Duanmu Hung-liang, evidencing a professional relationship developing into a personal friendship as well. Besides professional topics, subject matters include visiting plans and holiday greetings. Begun in 1986, the letters end in 1996 with a letter from a Chinese funeral committee announcing Duanmu's death (1:3).

2. Legal Documents. 1 folder (7 items). 1918-1995.

Documents in this series include Margaret's 1936 proof of Baptism from St. Benedict's Church, Greensboro, NC, and a 1965 letter releasing Margaret from vows as a Daughter of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul.

3. Literary Productions. 23 folders. 1934-2009.

This series covers Margaret Berry's prolific academic and personal writings. 1944-1948 essays treat topics on the Catholic Church and on literature (3:2). Earliest of preserved writings is from Margaret's 1934 high school newspaper, *Marillac* (for which she served as editor-in-chief) from St. Joseph's College High School (3:3). Theses for Master's (3:9) and Doctoral (3:5) degrees are here preserved, besides manuscripts for her 1988 book, *The Chinese Classic Novels: An Annotated Bibliography of Chiefly English-Language Studies* (re-issued in 2011, 3:6-8); *Mulk Raj Anand: the Man and the Novelist* (1971; 3:11); *Pegasus Over Asia: Ventures in East-West Literary Analysis* (1980, re-issued in 2011; 3:11); and numerous articles (3:17-19). Margaret's published and unpublished writings are listed in **Appendices B & C.**

Non-academic writings by Margaret include a 1968 travel journal of her journey to India, day-to-day events and outings with friends in India (3:20), and tributes to siblings Thomas Berry and Jim Berry (3:21).

4. Miscellaneous. 2 folders. ca. 1990s.

The first folder contains notes on Berry family history, notes on the 1996 family reunion, and Thomas Berry's poem "Margaret" (4:1). In the second folder are letters, academic papers and other documents 1986-1992, pertaining to Margaret's two visits to China for presentation of papers (4:2).

5. Photographic Material. 4 folders. ca. 1800s-2000.

Photos here encompass personal and professional aspects of Margaret Berry's life as well as more general family photos. In the first folder are family photographs from the 1920s and a portrait labeled "Grandmother Vize," Elizabeth Vize Berry's mother, dating from the late 1800s. A newspaper reprint depicts the E.C. Berry Registered Distillery from the late nineteenth century, the first of its kind in the vicinity (5:1).

Family photographs in the second folder include a 1951 family photograph of WN and Elizabeth Berry along with some of the thirteen children and grandchildren, a reprint of a Vize family portrait from between 1910-1920, and a 1949 photograph of the NC Catholic Laymen's Annual Retreat at Belmont Abbey, with WN Sr., Jack, and Joe Berry pictured (5:2).

The third folder includes 1990s family photos along with pictures taken by Margaret in India and China during the 1960s-1990s (5:3).

The last folder includes additional family photographs from the 1990s, several images of Margaret with her brother Thomas (WN Jr.), and photographs from Margaret's 1986 visit to China (5:4).

6. Printed Material. 10 folders. 1936-2019.

This series contains mostly awards and certificates along with a few articles. In 1990 Margaret was presented with a gold watch and a plaque for 25 years of service to John Carroll University (6:3). In 1996 she received from the College English Association an Honorary Life Membership (6:2). A fifth folder contains reviews of Margaret's books. Also included are her 1956 Doctorate in Philosophy diplomas from Saint John's University (6:8).

7. Scrapbook. 1 folder (1 item). 1936-1974.

This series contains a scrapbook of letters and photographs dating between 1936 and 1974. Many of the photographs are from Margaret's travels to Italy and India in the 1960s.

8. Video Tribute. 1 folder (3 items). 2012.

In this folder are two DVD discs of a 2012 tribute held at John Carroll University. The first disc contains footage of colleagues speaking about their time with Dr. Margaret Berry and her contributions to the field of Asian Studies. The second disc, marked Chinese Music Ensemble, is a musical concert by the East Asian Studies Department in honor of Dr. Berry. Included with the 2 discs is a note from Kathy at John Carroll University to Dr. Berry.

X. Maria François Theresa (Tess) Kelleher**1. Correspondence. 1 folder. 1989-2010.**

Correspondence in this series comes mostly from Teresa Berry Kelleher's children, many addressed to other family members, including Aunt Margaret, updating on family news and asking for cousin-family information.

2. Legal Documents. 1 folder (1 item). 1998.

This series contains the 1998 homeowners' insurance policy for Leo J. and Teresa Berry Kelleher.

3. Literary Productions. 2 folders. 1984-2007.

The first folder in this series contains writings by Teresa and Leo J. Kelleher's children, most prolific of which are by daughter Kathy and husband Mark Sohn. Several articles pertain to Mark's 1997 book *Mountain Country Cooking* (3:1). In "Growing Up with my Favorite Brother" Teresa describes her relationship with Brother (WN Jr., Father Thomas Berry; 3:2).

4. Photographic Material. 2 folders. ca. 1950s-2000s.

Photographs in this series relate mainly to the extended Kelleher family and range from the 1950s to later generations in the 2000s.

5. Printed Material. 2 folders. ca. 1970s-1999.

Clippings about Teresa's children include a photocopy of the 1973 wedding announcement for daughter Katherine Kelleher and Mark Sohn (5:1). The second folder holds the obituary and 1999 funeral service program for Teresa (Tess) Kelleher (5:2).

XI. Mary Elizabeth (Merse) Berry**1. Correspondence. 1 folder (8 items). 1945-1996.**

Letters here were written by or to Merse between 1945 and 1996. In the earliest written in 1948 by Merse to her mother and father from a nursing school in Washington, DC, she asks about her siblings and describes her training. The last letter, written in 1996 while residing with her community in Washington, DC, Merse describes the wedding of cousin Donny Donegan.

2. Miscellaneous. 1 folder (5 items). 2004.

Devoted to the death and remembrance of Mary Elizabeth (Merse or Sr. Elizabeth), this folder includes newspaper obituaries, signature pages from the funeral register, the burial program, and written remembrances.

3. Photographic Material. 1 folder (54 items). ca. 1930-2000s.

Photographs in this series show Mary Elizabeth with siblings and at work as a nun, notably as a medical missionary in Bolivia, South America, beginning in the mid-sixties. These photos depict scenes of everyday life around the villages in Bolivia.

4. Printed Material. 1 folder (5 items). 1962-1988.

Featured in this folder is the 1988 Golden Jubilee celebration honoring Sr. Mary Elizabeth's life as a Daughter of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul. Included are an invitation to the event, the Mass program, and the table listing for dinner. Also in the folder is a 1972 *Bolivian Bulletin* published by the Daughters of Charity.

5. Scrapbook. 2 folders. 1937-1974.

This scrapbook, compiled by Margaret Berry, covers many aspects of Mary Elizabeth's life, among them, her time as administrator of De Paul Hospital, Norfolk, VA, and her missionary work in Bolivia. Letters to her family, and photographs, begin in 1937 and continue through 1974. Also included are Merse's expired passport and driver's license.

XII. Stephen Badin (Steve) Berry

1. Correspondence. 1 folder (3 items). 2007-2008.

Emails between Margaret Berry and Stephen's children include mostly updates on their families for the Berry-Vize phone and address directory.

2. Photographic Material. 1 folder (31 items). ca. 1950s-2000s.

Among photographs in this series are a 1950s portrait of Stephen as a youth, and another with a young woman seated at Greensboro's Plantation Supper Club. Photographs of his own family with wife Rosemary Furlong begin in 1961 and culminate in photographs of the next generation attending family reunions.

3. Printed Material. 3 folders. 1949-1980s.

These folders of Steve Berry's family contain a wedding announcement for daughter Deborah Ann Berry (3:1); Steve's May 20, 1949, secondary-school diploma from Campion Jesuit High School, Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin (3:2); and a military training certificate from Notre Dame University's Reserve Officers' Training Corps (3:3).

XIII. Thomas Gabriel (Tom) Berry

1. Correspondence. 2 folders. 1939-2008.

Correspondence here comes from both Thomas Gabriel Berry and his son Peter. Included is a reprint from eight-year-old Thomas's 1939 letter to brother Benedict, away at school, updating him on the animals back home in Greensboro (1:1). Peter's letters to Aunt Margaret tell of family news and his upcoming visits to Greensboro (1:2).

2. Miscellaneous. 1 folder (2 items). 1995.

A 1995 obituary in this folder marks the death of Tom's father-in-law, Andrew Haven Eddy. A similar undated newspaper clipping reports the funeral of daughter Katie's father-in-law, Edward Osmann.

3. Photographic Material. 1 folder (49 items). 1946-2000s.

The earliest photograph in this series, from a yearbook, shows Thomas Gabriel Berry in military uniform. Photographs from the 1960s and 1970s depict him with his family, especially Peter and Anne.

4. Printed Material. 4 folders. 1937-2007.

The first folder contains items written by Thomas Gabriel's first wife, Virginia (Ginny) Kernan, and by children Peter (articles on bardic poetry and harp music) (4:1) and Anne. In the second folder in a 2006 letter to the editor of the Greensboro *News and Record* Thomas Gabriel disagrees with a recent columnist on Jimmy Carter's position regarding Israel (4:2). Musical performance programs in the third folder record cellist Anne Berry's 2007 Graduate Recital at Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, PA (4:3). The final folder contains Tom's fourth-grade report card, 1937-1938, and notice of his promotion to the fifth grade at St. Benedict's School, Greensboro (4:4).

XIV. William Nathan Berry Jr. (Father Thomas)**1. Correspondence. 2 folders. 1945-1999.**

WN Jr. (Brother, Father Thomas) wrote most of these family letters, the earliest 1945, while at St. Michael's Monastery, Union City, New Jersey; Immaculate Conception Monastery, Jamaica, NY; and Washington, DC, residences (1:1). Besides concern for family, the letters detail religious life and study. Margaret's letter to Sierra Club Books editors requests publication of her book *Thomas Berry: A Bio-bibliography* (1:2).

2. Legal Documents. 1 folder (3 items). No date.

Legal documents in this series include the Power of Attorney for and Last Will and Testament of William Nathan Jr. (Brother, Thomas Berry).

3. Literary Productions. 4 folders. ca. 1990s-2000s.

Among items by and about Brother (William Nathan Jr.) are his curriculum vitae and guide sheets to topics in his writings (3:1). Here also is a 1999 interview with Thomas at Warren Wilson College (3:2) and a poem entitled *Remembrance* dedicated to his brother Joseph Louis (3:3). In the last folder are recollections of Father Thomas by family and associates following his 2009 death (3:4).

4. Miscellaneous. 1 folder (10 items). ca. 2000s.

This grouping includes minutes of the Thomas Berry Foundation and a listing of artwork depicting Father Thomas.

5. Photographic Material. 3 folders. ca. 1915-2000s.

Photographs in this series from 1915 to the 2000s are family related. Older ones, such as the lineup of the current brood of children, are reproductions. Later pictures come from family reunions. Also included is a 50-minute documentary film entitled *Thomas Berry, The Great Story* (5:2) and an untitled DVD of Thomas's poems and stories as presented for the 2003 Earth Wisdom Conference.

6. Printed Material. 4 folders. 1974-2009.

Materials here vary from items written by Father Thomas to those about him and his work. A 1989 *Newsweek* article by Kenneth L. Woodward discusses Thomas's views on theology and ecology (6:1). The September 27, 2009, website *The Guardian* (letters@guardian.co.uk) offers a Thomas-Berry obituary (6:1). A September 24, 1995, *New York Times* clipping notes Thomas's receipt of the current Lannan Literary Award for non-fiction (6:2). Another, from *Columbia Daily Spectator*, September 25, 2009, reviews Thomas's posthumously published book, *The Sacred Universe* (6:2). Of many programs honoring Thomas in his lifetime, the third folder focuses on the 1994 Thomas-Berry evening at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York City, celebrating his 80th birthday (6:3).

7. Scrapbook. 1 folder (1 item). 1934-1998.

This scrapbook, compiled by Margaret Berry, consists of photographs, clippings, and writings, including an undated 8 x 10 photograph of Brother as a young priest standing next to his parents, and a 1934 postcard of New York City's Chrysler Building sent from Brother to his parents back home. Also here is a 1993 invitation to the presidential inauguration of William Jefferson Clinton.

XV. Other Family Members**1. Correspondence. 3 folders. 1976-2009.**

This series contains items pertaining to Berrys not direct descendents of WN and Bess Berry or their children. Included in the first folder is an email from cousin Sam Berry, Owensboro, KY, WN's original home (1:1). The second folder contains correspondence with the non-Carolina Berrys and Nan Markley, promoter of Bess Vize Berry's election as 1942 American Mother of the year (1:2). An email from Glenda Sue Vize provides information about Vize family members and their birth and death dates (1:3).

2. Photographs. 1 folder. ca. 1900s-2000s.

Photographs in this series are those of both Berry and Vize family members. Included is a portrait of Elizabeth Ernestine Vize Berry ca. 1900 and a 1927 photograph of the WN Berry family in front of their Kirkwood home in Greensboro with two of their then-11 children on a pony. Later photographs show Berry and Vize family members at various gatherings.

3. Personal Writings. 1 folder (7 items). 1982-1993.

This series contains personal writings of several Vize family members. Fred Vize's short story "The Outing" reminisces about a childhood outing in rural England after World War I (1921). Glenda Sue Vize describes the migration of the Vize Family from Kentucky to Iowa.

4. Printed Material. 2 folders. 1910-2001.

A photocopy of the 1910 wedding announcement of Elizabeth Vize to WN Berry in Owensboro, KY is followed by a 2001 newspaper obituary for Zachary T. Ralston, cousin of the Greensboro Berrys (4:1). A 1985 program advertises a painting exhibit featuring works by Fred Vize (4:2).

XVI. Genealogy**1. Berry. 6 folders. 1911-2008.**

This series deals with genealogical research on the Berry Family. The first folder contains a 1972 American Genealogical Research Institute book, entitled *The Berry Family* (1:1). A family Bible traces Berry-Vize births from that of the 1913 birth of second-child Mary Elizabeth (Merse) (1:2). Several family members traveled to England and their research suggests the family may connect with the English village of Berrynarbor (1:4-5).

2. Vize. 4 folders. ca. 1850s-2000s.

This series continues Vize genealogical research. Along with a family coat of arms (2:1), are research reports done by family members. Of particular note are photos of a Vize family gravestone, a nineteenth-century Vize family birth sheet (2:2), a paper on the origins of the Greensboro Vize connection (2:3), and information about the Belgian town of Visé (2:4).

XVII. Miscellaneous**1. Photographic Material. 1 folder (7 items). ca. 1970s-2000s.**

Photographs in this series are a miscellaneous group, including six family photographs of family gatherings from the late 1970s through the 2000s.

2. Printed Material. 1 folder (1 item). ca. 1980s.

The clipping in this folder, "Saloon Crowd Didn't see Piano Player's Troubles," does not pertain to any of the Berry-Vize family members.

XVIII. News & Reunions

1. **Berry-Vize Patch (BVP). 8 folders. 1980-2002.**

This family publication, compiled and edited by Margaret Berry, includes family history, family news, birthdays, and a family directory. Of particular note is the April 1981 issue with historical items such as the Berry-coat-of-arms and the Abraham- Lincoln-Berry connection (1:1). The January 1982 edition includes photocopies of birth and death pages from the family Bible (1:2). The August 1982 edition features the 1910 wedding announcement for Elizabeth Vize and William Nathan Berry and related photographs (1:3). Other entries offer original worksheets with color photographs attached (1:6). Notable in this group is the June 3, 2000, booklet (1:8).

2. **BVP Directories. 3 folders. 1993-2012.**

Berry-Vize directories (1981-2011) are bound, yearly folders with contact information and sprinklings of family photos.

3. **BVP Directory Worksheets. 3 folders. 1993-2008.**

Worksheets for *Berry Vize Patch Directories* offer original photographs and handwritten corrections for subsequent editions.

4. **BVP Inc. 1 folder. 1980-2009.**

A few copies of BVP along with financial and meeting information.

5. **Audio Cassette Tapes. 1 folder (4 items). 1981-2004.**

Four audio cassettes of recordings made during family reunions in 1981, 1983, 2003, and 2004.

6. **Reunion Agendas/Planning. 3 folders. 2000-2009.**

The three folders in this series contain notebooks of planning committee folders regarding several of the Berry-Vize Reunions. In particular are the notes for the 2000 (6:1), 2001 and 2003 (6:2), and 2005-2009 reunions (6:3).

7. **Reunion Photographs. 1 folder (4 items). ca. 1980s and 2000.**

Included in this folder are two photographs taken during reunions in the 1980s. There are two copies of an oversized photograph showing a large multi-generational gathering that took place in 2000 (oversize vertical).

8. **Printed Material. 1 folder (2 items). 1991 and 1996.**

A newspaper clipping from the People and Places section of the *Greensboro News & Record* highlights the novelty of the “trashless reunion” in 1991. Also in this folder is a photocopied flyer that invites and announces the events of the 1996 Berry-Vize Reunion.

Appendix A

W.N. Berry Family History & Biographical Sketches

by

In early 1913 as a Southern Railway employee from Middlesboro, Kentucky, William Nathan Berry (known as WN) and wife Elizabeth Ernestine Vize Berry (known as Bess) arrived in Greensboro, NC, at the old railroad station in south Greensboro. They came, in WN's words, "with \$2 and 2 children (two-year-old Jack and infant-in-arms Mary Elizabeth)." After several nights in old Hotel Clegg, they moved to Edgeworth Street, where they lived until 1920 when a second move brought them to 800 Douglas Street. Six years later they built and in 1927 moved into a large brick residence on Colonial Avenue in Kirkwood, an area at the time stipulating that "no residential transactions (selling, renting, boarding, etc.) be made with Negroes, other than as household servants."

While supervising the unloading of carloads of coal ordered by Greensboro groups, WN, pressed for a larger income, early recognized a growing market for fuel. Accordingly, in 1924 he and Bess formally opened the Berry Coal (and Wood) Company on West Bragg Street, with telephone number 5127, a wagon drawn by a horse named Bess, and a loan from Martin Douglas effected, not by witnessed paper signing, but by gentlemen shaking hands. In time trucks replaced the wagon, oil supplemented earlier fuels, air conditioning became a staple, the company moved successively to larger venues on West Lee Street and Bessemer Avenue, and the name morphed into the present Berico Fuels, Incorporated.

As secretary-treasurer, Bess sought orders and collected bills on a house-to-house basis, even while presiding over a growing household, which by 1933 numbered 8 sons, 5 daughters, and several cousins whose father had died. With a full-time cook from the beginning (WN believed in good and plentiful food), the household would also in time include a nurse for the current baby and a houseworker-chauffeur, often the cook's husband, to get children back and forth to school, church, scouting, library, sports, music and art lessons, and Y swimming

Devoted to his new city, WN early on participated in Greensboro civic activities, notably the Greensboro Merchants Association (serving as president on occasion) and the Lions Club. He and Bess faithfully attended St. Benedict's Catholic Church and supported newly opened (1926) St. Benedict's elementary school. Older children attended Catholic high schools and colleges in Emmitsburg, Maryland, boys at historic Mount St. Mary's Preparatory School, College, and Seminary and girls at St. Joseph's High School and College at the Provincial House of the Daughters of Charity.

All 13 children received a college education. Higher degrees included two Ph.D.s (history and English), one MD (obstetrician and gynecologist), one Licentiate (philosophy), and Master's degrees respectively in hospital administration, South Asian studies, and

mathematics. In addition, all 8 sons served in the military, 4 during World War II and 4 during the Korean War of the 50s. In 1942 the Golden Rule Foundation of America conferred on Bess Vize Berry its highest award: American Mother of the Year.

The histories of the 13 children, of whom 7 remained Greensboro residents and 2 returned in later years, honor their parents and their city:

John Vize (Jack) (1911-1990). A 1933 Mt. St. Mary's College graduate, Jack succeeded his father as president of Berico Fuels, served as president of the Greensboro Country Club (in which he promoted a more diverse membership), won golf championships, and for over fifty years participated in Greensboro civic, business, social, and religious organizations, often serving on their Boards. With wife Jessie Douglas he has 4 children: J. Madeleine, Margaret, M. Douglas, and Lucy.

Mary Elizabeth (Merse) (1913-2004). Daughter of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul for 66 years (1938-2004), Sister Elizabeth served as administrator of Providence Hospital, Detroit, MI, for six years, and of De Paul Hospital, Norfolk, VA, for four years. Her skills then directed to foreign mission work in Bolivia, South America, she, in Cochabamba, Trinidad, and La Paz, for 23 years served the poor in hospital management and neighborhood clinics. Retiring to the States in 1985, she spent her last years as rehabilitation counselor and Community adviser on ecological and Earth literacy matters.

William Nathan Jr. (family name *Brother*, religious name *Father Thomas*) (1914-2009). Passionist priest and internationally recognized ecologist and historian of cultures, Thomas focused his writings and lectures on humans' relations with the cosmos and Earth. His works have notably influenced the intellectual/spiritual history of the twentieth- and early twenty-first centuries.

Second of eight sons in a family of thirteen children, following 1933 entry into the Passionist Religious Order, Brother adopted the name Thomas after philosopher-theologian Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274). A Catholic University of America doctorate concluded with publication of his research on the historical theory of philosopher-historian Giambattista Vico 1668-1744 (Catholic University of America Press, 1951).

Believing the wisdom of Asia indispensable for adequate learning, Thomas went to China in 1948 to study and teach at Beijing's Fu Jen University, returning to America in 1949 when Mao Tse-tung took over China. Subsequent studies in Chinese language and culture at Seton Hall University and Sanskrit and South Asian culture at Columbia University were interrupted by service as United States Army chaplain in Germany 1951-54. Afterwards Thomas undertook a teaching career, first with the Asian institutes of Seton Hall University (1956-1961) and St. John's University (1961-65); and, finally, at Fordham University, where he instituted the doctoral program in the history of religions (1966-1979).

In 1970 in the Bronx, NY, Thomas inaugurated the Riverdale Center for Religious Research (1970-95). From this base and with his presidency of the American Teilhard Society (1975-1987), Thomas's international influence as thinker, writer, and lecturer expanded rapidly. Annual conferences explored themes such as Energy: Its Cosmic-Human Dimensions; The Future: Technological Society Man's Covenant?; New York as Sacred City; and The Ecological Age. From across the globe scholars and others came to the Center for

rethinking their disciplines in the light of newly understood relations of humans to Earth. In 1998 as part of Harvard's international Forum on Religion and Ecology (FORE), the Thomas Berry Foundation was established by Mary Evelyn Tucker and John Grim, currently of Yale University.

Besides the eleven-volume *Riverdale Papers* and treatises on *Buddhism* (1966) and *The Religions of India* (1971), the most influential of Berry's books are *The Dream of the Earth* (1988, National Lannan Non-Fiction Award 1992); *The Universe Story: From the Primordial Flaring Forth to the Ecozoic Era* (with mathematical-cosmologist Brian Swimme, 1992); and *The Great Work: Our Way Into the Future* (1999). Other books include *Evening Thoughts: Reflecting on Earth as Sacred Community* (Sierra Club Books, University of California Press, 2006) and *The Sacred Universe: Earth, Spirituality, and Religion in the Twenty-first Century* (2009). The Thomas M. Berry Papers are housed in Harvard University's Environmental Science and Public Policy Archives.

Besides eight honorary doctorates, Thomas's awards include among others the United States Catholic Mission Association Award (1989); the 1992 James Herriot Award of the Humane Society of the United States; Honorary Canonship of the Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York City (1992); the 1993 Bishop Carroll T. Dozier Medal for Peace and Justice; the Catholic University of America 1993 Alumni Research and Scholarship Award; the 1992 Prescott College Environmental Award; annual Thomas Berry Lecture Awards established by the College of Mt. St. Vincent on the Hudson and, in Washington, DC, by the Center for Respect of Life and Environment and the Humane Society of the United States; a Thomas Berry Hall and annual Thomas Berry Seminars at Whidbey Institute, Whidbey Island, WA.; and the Thomas Berry Student Writing Award at Warren Wilson College, Asheville, NC (2005).

Thomas's last years (2004-2009) were spent in Greensboro's Well-Spring Retirement Community, where he continued contact with his associates and work on his publications.

Francis Xavier (Frank) (1916-2006). After a Notre Dame University baccalaureate degree, Frank trained in obstetrics-gynecology at Georgetown University Medical School, and, with interruption for Air Force service, interned in St. Louis, MO, hospitals. After serving as physician to Greensboro residents for 33 years before retirement, Frank resumed oil painting, a one-time hobby, along with golf, often playing in Country Club tournaments. With wife Polly Hutchins, Frank has daughters Susan and Patricia.

James Fant (Jim) (1917-1997). Following 1940 graduation from West Point Military Academy, Jim entered the Army Air Force, his skills promptly applied to anti-submarine routs and raids over Germany. Postwar assignments for Colonel Berry included multi-site command training; Columbia University training in military government preceding occupation duties in postwar Germany; study at the Canadian National Defense College; a 4-year stint at the Pentagon; and commands in Japan, Hawaii, and, finally, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

After 28 years' Air Force service Jim retired with wife Mary Elizabeth Loram and children Mary Beth, Anne, Michael, and Gabriel to Raleigh, NC, where, hoping to teach and thereby enlighten the young about the follies of war, he obtained a NC State University Master's degree in mathematics. In time he settled down to the founding and direction of the Center for Reflection on the Second Law (entropy), famous for its 250 circulars and yearly Camp New Hope conferences, all directed to the elimination of war and defense of the Earth community.

In 1987-1988 Jim became president of the North American Conference on Christianity and Ecology. Founder and former NACCE president David Haenke wrote of Jim's death: "It hit me hard. Jim was a lion heart for Earth, for brother Thomas's world-shaking vision, for the Christian ecology movement, for integrity itself. Jim was the walking heart of integrity, of soul-deep nobility of being. He embodied the best of a generation, made long journeys of the soul, from World War II Army Intelligence in a war that was at its essence a vast assault on Earth itself, to relentless, passionate advocacy for that same Earth." Jim was noted for fierce defense of social justice, especially relative to the poor, the imprisoned, and the oppressed.

Margaret (1918-2019). Holding a St. John's University Ph.D. in nineteenth-century English literature (1956) and a University of Pennsylvania postdoctoral degree in South Asian Studies (1969), Margaret taught at the college and university levels, and she authored three published books: *The Chinese Classic Novels: An Annotated Bibliography of Chiefly English-Language Studies* (1988, 2011), named by American Library Association's May 1989 *Choice* among the year's outstanding reference works, *Pegasus Over Asia: Ventures in East-West Literary Analysis* (1980, 2011), and *Mulk Raj Anand, The Man and the Novelist* (1971); numerous published articles; and two unpublished novels, *The Tennis Club* and *Amaranthine Weed*.

Ford, Fulbright, Danforth, and NDEA awards join others Margaret won from the University of Pennsylvania, Duke University, the Japan Foundation, the Association for Asian Studies, and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Besides Europe, her travels included South America, Australia, China, Japan, and India. Offices held included presidency of the local American Association of University Professors (AAUP) and of the College English Association of Ohio, a five-year stint on MLA's Asian Literatures Executive Committee, and long service on the Board of Directors of the national College English Association.

Following 1993 retirement from John Carroll University in Cleveland, Ohio, Margaret made her home in her native Greensboro, where she served as liaison for Harvard University's Archives for Environmental Science and Public Policy as it acquired the papers of her brother, well-known ecologist, cultural historian, and author Thomas Berry.

Katherine Anita Fuller (Kay) (1920-1983). Following the premature death of husband Richard Monroe Fuller, father of her 7 children (Margaret Ann, Martha, Richard, Tom, Matt, Mary Teresa, and Janie), Katherine turned to the profession of document analysis, attained certification and recognition in the World Association of Document Examiners (WADE) and the International Graphoanalysis Society, served as expert witness in court cases, taught classes on the subject in her home laboratory, and published articles on her experiences--activities terminated by Kay's death at age 63.

Joseph Louis (Joe) (1921-1996). Having excelled in studies, field sports (football captain), and student governance (president) at Catholic, laity-run Newman School in Lakewood, NJ, and completed a football scholarship year at Notre Dame University, Joe was appointed to the United States Military Academy, followed four years later by active combat on aircraft carrier USS *Nashville* and flight training in Pensacola, Fl.

At his father's request, Joe left the Navy in 1945 to join Berico Fuels. Succeeding brother Jack as president in 1979, Joe participated regularly in city, county, state, and national organizations associated with the oil industry, at one time serving as national chair of the

Homeheating Oil Association and at another giving seminars in China on oil management. Other activities included prison ministry, Red Cross, Board work with Guilford College and the Elon Children's Home Society, and chairmanship of the Greensboro Human Relations Commission. His awards included the Brotherhood Citation of the Greensboro Chapter of the National Conference on Christians and Jews and the Thomas A. Dooley Award for Humanitarian Service bestowed by Notre Dame University Alumni Association. With wife Jean Lindsay, Joe has seven children: Billy, Mary (Bobo), Ann, Tom, Fred, Teecie, and Philip.

Ann Louise (Ann) (1922-1958). After graduation from St. Joseph College, Ann entered the Maryknoll Missionaries and in post-formation years, as Sister Zoé Marie, was sent briefly to Honolulu and then to Manila in the Philippines. Having taught biology there for ten years, Ann returned to the United States for R and R, only to discover an illness resulting in her death at age 36 and burial in the order's original cemetery.

Marie François Thérèse Kelleher (Tess) (1924-1999). After completion of the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, business program and a year's subsequent employment, Tess became the wartime bride of Leo J. Kelleher Jr., at Maxwell Air Force Base, TX, in 1944. Returning to Greensboro after the war, the two started their family, destined to number 8 children: Kathy, Terry, Jim, Frank, Joe, Zoe, Zach, and Mike. Tess's intellectual and creative energies found expression in church, school, and civic activities, in all of which she regularly and courageously championed minorities, and for two years served as public-relations director for the Greensboro Chapter of the National Association for Learning Disabilities. Yearning for learning led her to numerous classes at Guilford College, UNCG, Greensboro College, and Guilford Technical Community College.

Benedict Regis (Ben) (1926-2017). The comedian of the family, Ben was educated at Belmont Abbey Prep School, St. Vincent Abbey (Latrobe, PA), St. Benedict's College (Atchison, KS), Mt. St. Mary's (Emmitsburg, MD), and Laval University (Quebec, Canada). At Laval he pursued the Licentiate in philosophy until called to Army service as tank-division officer during the Korean War. Afterwards Ben taught philosophy at Belmont Abbey College and for over 20 years at Gaston College near Charlotte, NC. A Fulbright Foundation trip to India for observation and research marked the summer of 1988. In retirement Ben cultivated landscaping, bird-watching, and golf. With wife Jerry Ball he had children John and Jennifer.

Thomas Gabriel (Tom) (1929-2022). Blue-eyed, tow-haired seventh son Tom completed high school at Cardinal Farley Military Academy (Rhinecliff, NY), followed by college and graduate work at both Mt. St. Mary's and Laval University (Quebec, Canada). Apart from 30-year service with Berico Fuels, Tom's interests were political caucusing, ecological action, and landscape gardening. Special love for animals and outdoor life also marked his days, with canoeing his favorite sport in contrast to his brothers' lifelong interest in golf. He also resumed study of the violin and played with Greensboro's Philharmonia Orchestra for many years. With first wife Ginny, Tom had 5 children: Peter, Joe, twins Katie and Lisa, and Mary Virginia; and with second wife Stephanie, Anne Gabriel, doctoral candidate in cello at the Hartt School of Music, University of Hartford, Hartford, CT.

Stephen Badin (Steve) (1933-2011). Named for a Kentucky priest, the first to be ordained in America, Steve was graduated from Champion High School (Prairie du Chien, WI) and the University of Notre Dame. In the United States Naval Air Corps his proficiency led to appointment as flight instructor, and later as officer at air stations including Pensacola, FL; Hutchinson, KA; and on the aircraft carrier USS *Oriskany*. In his Greensboro career as lumber and furniture merchant and founder of ABW Lumber Industries, Steve's aviation skills proved important. He served as director of the Appalachian Lumbermen's Club and as president of the local chapter of Notre Dame University Alumni. With wife Rosemary he had 4 sons and a daughter: Shawn, Steve Jr., Brian, Chris, and Debbie.

The following accounts are a sampling of Berry family achievers in the second generation:

J. Madeleine (Berry) Nash, daughter of John Vize (Jack) and Jessie Douglas Berry and graduate of Walter Hines Page High School and of Bryn Mawr College. As a Senior Correspondent (now retired) for *TIME* magazine and as a freelance writer for various publications, J. Madeleine Nash has long specialized in science reporting. Among some 600 *TIME* articles are many cover stories, including "How Life Began" (October 11, 1993), "Hope in the War Against Cancer" (April 25, 1994), "Evolution's Big Bang" (December 4, 1995), "On the Trail of Twisters" (May 20, 1997), "How A Child's Brain Develops" (February 3, 1997), "Grains of Hope," (July 31, 2000), and "The Secrets of Autism" (May 6, 2002). With colleague Michael Lemonick, she co-authored the cover story "When Did the Universe Begin?" (March 6, 1995). Contributions by Nash to multipart *TIME* specials include "Einstein's Unfinished Symphony," *TIME*'s Year 2000 "Person of the Century" issue.

In 2002 Warner Books published Nash's book *El Niño: Unlocking the Secrets of the Master Weather-Maker*. She then went on to write a number of articles about weather and climate, including "Storm Warnings" (*Smithsonian Magazine*, September 2006) and "Back to the Future" (*High Country News*, October 13, 2008). The latter was featured in the 2009 editions of two anthologies, *The Best American Science Writing* and *The Best American Science and Nature Writing*.

In 1996 Nash received the AAAS Science Journalism Award for "Evolution's Big Bang." With other *TIME* colleagues, Nash shared the AAAS-Westinghouse Award for the cover stories "Smash: Colossal Colliders Are Unlocking the Secrets of the Universe" (April 16, 1990) and "Wiring the Future: The Superconductivity Revolution" (May 11, 1987). In 2004 Nash received the American Geophysical Union's David Perlman Award for the *TIME* article "Fireproofing the Forests" (August 18, 2003). In 2010 she received the National Association of Science Writers' Science in Society Journalism Award for the *High Country News* article "Bring in the Cows" (May 18, 2009).

Nash is well known for her sense of adventure. In 2006 with photographer-physicist husband Thomas Nash, she accompanied noted glaciologist Lonnie Thompson on an expedition to southwest Tibet's largest mountain, Naimona'nyi, a journey reported in the July 2007 *Smithsonian* as "Chronicling the Ice." On the website, the Yale Forum on Climate Change and the Media, she told the background story. Nash is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Geophysical Union, the Authors Guild, the National Association of Science Writers and the Society of Environmental Journalists. In 1996 Sigma Xi, the scientific research society, voted to induct her as an honorary member.

Mary Elizabeth Berry, daughter of James Fant and Mary Elizabeth Berry: A Harvard University Ph.D. in Japanese history, Mary Beth, Professor of East Asian History (Pre-Modern Japan), currently chairs the University of California, Berkeley, history department. In 2004 she served as president (2004-2006) of the Association for Asian Studies, the second largest academic association of its kind. Her major publications are *Japan in Print: Information and Nation in the Early Modern Period* (UC Press, 2007); *The Culture of Civil War in Kyoto* (UC Press, 1994); and *Hideyoshi* (1982). With husband Donald Shively (Harvard Professor, recipient of Japan's highest award to a non-Japanese), Mary Beth is parent of Anne and Kate (Middle Eastern Studies, with Arabic language specialty), recent graduates of Oberlin College and now studying, respectively, at the University of Michigan (neuroscience) and New York University Law School.

James Michael Berry, son of James Fant and Mary Elizabeth Looram Berry and, since January 1996, president of the Roger Tory Peterson Institute of Natural History in Jamestown, NY. The mission of the Institute is to continue the legacy of Roger Tory Peterson by promoting the teaching and study of nature, and to thereby create knowledge of and appreciation and responsibility for the natural world. Jim and Mary are parents of Emily, Seth, and Chris.

Gabriel Berry, daughter of James Fant and Mary Elizabeth Looram Berry. Costume designer internationally recognized and winner of OBIE (sponsored by *The Village Voice* and created to celebrate alternative theater in New York); BESSIE (New York Dance and Performance), and the Prague 1995 Design Quadrennial medal for her work in experimental theater, the only American to be so honored. Shakespearean plays costumed by Gabriel include *Henry IV* parts 1 and 2, *Henry V*, and *The Tempest*, as well as Bertolt Brecht's *The Threepenny Opera*. Recent work includes Meredith Monk and Ann Hamilton's *Mercy* at the Brooklyn Academy of Music and Yoshiko Chuma's *Tunnel* for the first annual Dublin Dance Festival. Upcoming projects include *Flow* for New York's Hip Hop Festival, *Henry V* for The Public Theater's Shakespeare in the Park and *The Mother of Us All* for the San Francisco Opera.
